### Welcome to 2022!

### **Retirement Living Acquisition**

I am extremely pleased to announce that Resthaven has acquired the award-winning Chiton Retirement Living village at 2 Ocean Road, Chiton.

This acquisition complements Resthaven's continued expansion into the Fleurieu region with new community services offices and services in Goolwa and Victor Harbor. Read more on page 8.

### **COVID-19 Booster Vaccinations**

Thank you to everyone who has already had their COVID-19 booster vaccination. If you are not yet triple vaccinated, I encourage you to book now.

Booster clinics are planned or have already been held at all Resthaven residential sites. For those living in the community, booster doses are available at participating SA Health vaccination clinics, GPs, pharmacies, and Respiratory Clinics.

### **Industry News**

It is almost a year since the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety released its final report, which was the culmination of 28 months of work, with over 10,500 submissions.

In May 2021, the Australian Government announced a \$17.7 billion aged care reform package over five years. The aged care reform was built of five pillars, including home care, residential aged care services and sustainability, residential aged care quality and safety, workforce and governance.

Some of the initiatives require a change of legislation, yet it is not yet clear when the Federal Parliament will next sit to finalise the changes. The delay may influence the timing of the additional funding.

The Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety presented a once in a generation opportunity to make the necessary changes to the aged care system to ensure that it meets the needs of future generations.

The promises made following the Royal Commission must be honoured, regardless of who gains power after the upcoming federal election. Everyone must show they care about aged care.

### **Board Update**

As mentioned in the last edition of this newsletter, in October 2021, we farewelled former Deputy President, Ben Sarre, from the Resthaven Board.

Effective 1 November 2021, Stephanie Rozokos was appointed as Deputy President. Stephanie is the Chief Financial Officer of the South Australian Tourism Commission. We are fortunate to have someone of Stephanie's calibre on the Board, and wish her every success in the role.



### **Christmas Hamper Donations**

Every year across Resthaven, residents, clients, staff and volunteers support many charity Christmas appeals.

In December 2021, Resthaven head office and maintenance staff provided Christmas hamper donations for Uniting Communities Eastern Services Christmas Appeal. Hampers were distributed to around 120 families prior to Christmas to bring a little joy to those in need. Thank you for your generosity.

### **Service Growth**

As mentioned in the building update, a new overnight and day respite cottage is being prepared at 18 Halcyon Circuit, Aldinga Beach. We expect this will be operational in March. The new outreach office for Victor Harbor, which includes a respite cottage, will also be operational shortly.

Welcome to 2022. The current environment makes it very difficult to plan building activities, however, we are doing our best to balance our various projects with the safety of residents, clients and staff.

### **Resthaven Bellevue Heights**

Prior to Christmas 2021, works were progressing well on the 12 place extension at Resthaven Bellevue Heights, part of the major redevelopment of the home. However, works have now been delayed due to COVID-19. We have recommenced works in external areas, and set strict protocol for limited internal works. In good news, the Auditorium is complete, with very positive feedback (see page 20). The project is scheduled to be completed in June 2023.

### **Resthaven Westbourne Park**

Kennett Builders have been appointed as the managing contractors for the Resthaven Westbourne Park redevelopment. The design process and detailed planning is progressing. A co-design workshop with residents and families was held in November 2021, which received very positive feedback. This input is now being reviewed, and construction is estimated to commence later this year, and be complete in mid-2024.

The project involves replacement of Hampton and Richmond, refurbishment of Marlborough communal areas, a new entry with central garden, café, hall, new kitchen and laundry, staff room and service areas.



### **Resthaven Community Respite Services**

In December 2021, Resthaven purchased a house at 18 Halcyon Circuit, Aldinga Beach. This house (pictured above) will be converted into a new respite service for the southern area. It is expected the service will become operational in March 2022.

### Resthaven Murray Bridge, Hills & **Fleurieu Community Services**

Works continue on fitout and upgrades to Unit 5, Victoria Street, Victor Harbor, for a new outreach office for Resthaven Murray Bridge, Hills & Fleurieu Community Services. This office will serve as an administration area for 16 staff workstations.

A co-located house at 1-3 Newland Street, Victor Harbor, is being refurbished to provide community respite for the area (see page 12). It is anticipated that the office will be open in April 2022, and the house shortly after.

### **Resthaven Mitcham**

Work is underway to repair damage caused by an electrical fault in the ceiling cavity.

### **Solar Panels Project**

Finally, a new project is being initiated to review the cost benefit analysis of the installation of rooftop solar panels across Resthaven. This project will investigate developing a plan for all sites. This is the first step in reducing our carbon footprint.

### **Resthaven acquires Chiton Retirement Living**

As mentioned in the CEO's update, we are delighted to announce that Resthaven has purchased the Chiton Retirement Living village, to add to Resthaven's suite of options for older people.

Located at 2 Ocean Road, Chiton, the retirement village is only three kilometres from Resthaven's Port Elliot site, which includes a residential aged care home and community services office.

Chiton Retirement Living represents the next investment in Resthaven's retirement living portfolio, following the acquisition of On Statenborough in July 2021.

Resthaven senior management met with the Chiton residents prior to taking ownership. Settlement took place on 28 February 2022.



Chiton Retirement Living features 29 modern architectural homes, nestled between Port Elliot and Victor Harbor.

Chiton has won a number of awards, including the 'Excellence in Seniors Living Award' in 2017, the national 'Environmental Excellence' Award in 2013 and the Master Builders' National Excellence in Building and Construction Award for 'National Lifestyle Housing for Seniors' in 2015.

Resthaven Community Respite Services hosts a social group at The Shed, at Township Road, Marion. The members of The Shed group have been busy teaming up with Minton Farm Native Animal Rescue Centre (MFNARC) at the Cherry Gardens Animal Rescue Service.

Assistant Manager, Julian Sporne, says, 'The group members have been working on a variety of projects for the community, including growing native tree and bush seedlings, and building possum and bird nesting boxes' (pictured below).



The group met with Bev Langley from MFNARC back in May 2021, in search of a meaningful project.

'We knew the landowners nearby had been impacted by the bushfires, and the group insisted on helping in any way they could. They each have their own handy-man skills to make it possible.'



'Upon learning that they needed possum and bird boxes and trees, we approached Trees for Life, and organised to purchase seedling kits for the varieties that were best suited for the area.'

'We took a template of a bird box from Bev, and the group went about building some boxes to their design.'

On 26 January 2022, Julian (pictured above) had the pleasure of dropping off the finished projects to the Cherry Gardens Animal Rescue Centre.

# Respite House to Open in Victor Harbor



### What is Respite?

Resthaven supports people who care for someone to have a break from their caring role. Carers need time out to look after themselves and their own needs. This may be going to work, a social engagement, an appointment, a medical procedure, or a volunteer commitment.

Having some respite helps keep carers healthy; improving the quality of care they can provide. A little respite support can sustain carers so they can continue their caring role, and the person they care for can stay living at home for longer.

### **New Respite Location**

As mentioned on page 6, a respite cottage has been leased at 1-3 Newland Street, Victor Harbor. It will provide day respite and overnight respite services for older people in the area, faciliated via Resthaven Murray Bridge, Hills & Fleurieu Community Services.

It is currently being refurbished, and aims to open around April 2022. Watch this space!

# Happy 105<sup>th</sup> Birthday: Mr Norman Lewis

### Mr Lewis remains independent at 105-years-old

On 24 December 2021, Resthaven Marion Community Services client, Mr Norman Lewis, celebrated his 105th birthday.

Norman was born in South Australia, and enjoyed school, particularly geology. He went on to complete a Bachelor of Science at the University of Adelaide, then a cadetship with the Woods and Forest Department, as it was called then (now Forestry SA), working under Professor Douglas Mawson, who inspired in him a dream to travel to Antarctica.

At age 28, Norman met his wife, Mavis.

'I want to say Mavis was one in a million, but she really left all the other girls behind,' he says.

The couple married in 1948, soon welcoming two children into their family.

In 1957, Norman was awarded a scholarship to study his honours at Oxford University, in England (right).

Later, the family returned to their home in South Australia, settling in Glenelg North, where Norman still resides today.



Norman retired as Head of the Department in his 70s, but had a goal in mind—to visit Antarctica. He ended up visiting three times, the last aged 92!



During his life, Norman wrote and published five books on forestry, and also received several medals, including the Imperial Service Order (above), for his contribution to South Australian forestry.

Today, Norman continues living independently in his home, with support from Resthaven.

He is involved in various social clubs. including two Rotary clubs (below), two Probus clubs, and remains an honorary member for Forestry SA.

'There are endless hours of fun ahead for us here - stay tuned!'



# Happy 100th Birthday: Mrs Jean Croxton

'It's not what happens to you, it's how you handle it.'

On 29 December 2021, Resthaven Onkaparinga Community Services client, Mrs Phyllis 'Jean' Croxton, celebrated her 100th birthday in the comfort of her home.

'I was born in 1921, growing up with five brothers and two sisters in Norwood.'

Jean spent seven years in school, and after completing her qualifying exam, she began her career as a dressmaker at Vogue Australia. Little did she know, she would become one of the best dressmakers of her time, highly coveted by Vogue and the fashion community across Australia.

'I had no desire to marry young, as others around me did. I was quite ambitious and happy in my career, where I stayed until retiring in my 70s.'

In 1943, Jean discovered she had bowel cancer, which she has now had for 80 years. 'I'm known to say, "you can always turn lemons into lemonade", and I was hopeful that I could do that through this next challenge in my life, and I did.'

'In 2000, I carried the Olympic torch over the bridge at Regency Park – I am so happy that I was able to do that.'

While Jean was dealing with more than the average young adult in their 20s, it was during this time that she fell in love with her brother's childhood friend, Ronald - 'Ron'.

'Ron found out I was sick, and he came to visit me at home. I didn't know that he cared much about me until then.'

'Soon after that, he went off to war, so we became pen-pals. We continued to write to each other for two years.' Jean also found herself entrenched in the war, due to a shortage of nurses. She worked as a Red Cross Nurse for a short time, before returning home to support her sister.



'When Ron was away, my sister went into labour, but

didn't live long enough to hold her baby. I sent Ron a telegraph to let him know I wanted to take her on as my own. Telegraphs back then were sometimes unclear, and he returned to a big surprise!'

'We married once Ron returned from war. My father gave us his blessing to raise Frances in our home – we couldn't be happier, because we already saw her as our daughter.'

When Jean retired, and her husband passed away, she found a new lease on life: 'My entire house is filled with oil paintings from my travels, and things I hold close to my heart. I have sold many, and gifted to those I love.'

Currently, Jean resides in her home, with the support of her daughter, Frances, and Resthaven Onkaparinga Community Services.

'If it wasn't for Resthaven, I wouldn't have made it this far. It is important to be able to live in your home for as long as possible, and I commend Resthaven for making that possible.'

Jean's words of wisdom to the younger generations is, 'It's not what happens to you, it's how you handle it. I am grateful for everything that I have, and the life I have lived.'

Thank you for sharing your magnificent life with us, Jean. Many happy returns!
