Thank You

As we near the end of what has been another incredibly busy year, I would like to thank you for your support of our staff teams. This year, we have continued to meet the challenges associated with the pandemic, while also responding to the significant reform agenda. I sincerely thank you all.

COVID-19

Recently, major changes were made by the State Government, regarding easing of COVID-19 restrictions for visitors at **Residential Aged Care Homes:**

- Visitors are no longer required to be vaccinated against Influenza or COVID-19
- Visitors are no longer required to sign in on entry to the home, or undertake temperature checks
- Visiting hours are no longer restricted.

You are encouraged to remain 1.5m away from one another where possible, particularly in indoor communal areas, and to wear masks where indicated.

Industry Updates

The Department of Health and Aged Care has developed a Code of Conduct for Aged Care (Code), in response to the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety. It commences on 1 December 2022. The Code (see page 4) will apply to approved providers, their aged care workers and governing persons and will give older Australians receiving aged care more confidence in the workforce assisting them.

The Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission will be responsible for monitoring and enforcing compliance with the Code. The Code is the first element of the Government's national registration scheme for personal care workers to be implemented.


Work Value Case (FWC)

The Fair Work Commission (FWC) has handed down an interim 15% increase for pay rates for Registered Nurses, Enrolled Nurses, Assistants in Nursing, Personal Care Assistants, and aged care workers on the Aged Care Award 2010, the Nurses Award 2020, and the Social, Communities, Home Care and Disability Services Awards 2010.

The FWC is yet to announce when and how these increases will become operative. This is an encouraging outcome for our staff, and an acknowledgement of the work they do.

He is also a director of the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra.

We warmly welcome Freddy and his extensive knowledge and experience to the Resthaven Board.

Aged Care Code of Conduct

The Department of Health and Aged Care has developed this Code of Conduct for Aged Care, in response to the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety.

When providing care, supports and services to people, I must:

- (a) act with respect for people's rights to freedom of expression, selfdetermination and decision-making in accordance with applicable laws and conventions;
- (b) act in a way that treats people with dignity and respect, and values their diversity;
- (c) act with respect for the privacy of people;
- (d) provide care, supports and services in a safe and competent manner, with care and skill;
- (e) act with integrity, honesty and transparency;
- (f) promptly take steps to raise and act on concerns about matters that may impact the quality and safety of care, supports and services;
- (g) provide care, supports and services free from:
 - (i) all forms of violence, discrimination, exploitation, neglect and abuse;
 - (ii) sexual misconduct;
- (h) take all reasonable steps to prevent and respond to:
 - (i) all forms of violence, discrimination, exploitation, neglect and abuse;
 - (ii) sexual misconduct.

COVID-Safe

With the recent prevalence of COVID-19 in the community, a reminder not to attend social groups if you are not well or have any symptoms, and to notify staff before they attend your home. Staff continue to wear masks when providing personal care services in your home.

Serious Incident Response Scheme

The Government has introduced new reporting requirements for reporting incidents related to client care and services.

From 1 December, Resthaven is required to report to the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission through the Serious Incident Response Scheme a range of events that we already monitor and manage in our internal systems to ensure client safety.

If you have any concerns about the quality of the care you are receiving from the Resthaven staff who deliver your services, please ensure that you let your coordinator or the Community Services Manager know of your concerns, so they can be addressed.

Be Prepared

With the Murray River in flood, unpredictable weather, and fire season on its way, please make sure your safety plans are up to date and that you advise our staff of what your plans are in an emergency situation. Please consider your personal safety.

With the recent wild weather across South Australia, Resthaven Community Services staff are undertaking welfare checks on clients who may have been affected.

Clients in flood-prone areas have been sent letters outlining the risks as advised by local authorities. Please heed the emergency services warnings and relocate early for your own safety. Please be aware that Resthaven is not to be relied upon for emergency evacuations; remember if you are unable to leave your property or are isolated due to flooding, then our staff are unable to access your property for the same reasons. The local SES or police should be contacted in an emergency.

Christmas is just around the corner! It's amazing how quickly the year has gone.

Resthaven Bellevue Heights

As part of the Resthaven Bellevue Heights major redevelopment, the new 12-place extension to Correa and Waratah is now complete, as are the refurbished areas of Correa and Waratah. Residents are being relocated into the newly refurbished rooms.

Stage 2 has commenced, with Manson already demolished. The internal refurbishment of Banksia has commenced. The project is scheduled to be complete in December 2023.

Resthaven Westbourne Park

The design phase of the Resthaven Westbourne Park major redevelopment is almost complete. Works are scheduled to commence soon, and run until August 2025.

The project involves replacement of the Hampton and Richmond wings, a new entry, cafe, hall, kitchen and laundry, staff room, and back of house service areas. The cottages on Norseman Avenue, and part of Hampton/ Richmond, will be demolished before the end of the year, to allow works to begin.

The new design connects all areas of the site to a central cloister courtyard (artist's impression above right). This will be the central meeting place, with a key focus on ensuring that outside areas always connect with internal. Everyone is excited to get the project started.



Resthaven Chiton Retirement Village

The Resthaven Chiton Retirement Village has a broader masterplan to build additional units onsite. We are currently evaluating options regarding building a connecting road, garden reserve, caravan park, and additional retirement units.

Options were recently shared with village residents at the Annual General Meeting in October. They are excited to see the village finally completed and look forward to consultation and finalising a scheme.

Smart Road, Modbury

The Department of Infrastructure and Transport has completed the temporary car park on Resthaven's vacant land at Smart Road, Modbury. This forms part of the O'Bahn redevelopment project.

We continue to consider different options for future use of the land, to align with supply and demand for both residential aged care and retirement living within the area.

Solar Panels Project

An initial analysis regarding the installation of roof top solar panels at all Resthaven sites has been undertaken, along with an estimate of costs and cost benefit analysis. The next step will be developing a scope, a project plan, and specifications for all sites.

We look forward to another busy year ahead in building services!

Resthaven Community Respite Services

Recollections of Country Living

Resthaven Community Respite Services 'Hersey Cottages' guest, Pam, recently shared her recollections of growing up in eastern South Australia in the 1950s.

A self-confessed 'country girl,' Pam grew up between Renmark and the Victorian border, on a 3,000 acre farm. 'We grew wheat, and ran 1,800 sheep – you had to have both, as the sheep ate the stubble,' she says. 'That's what most farmers did. We also had 16 acres of lucerne patch.'

'There was a workman's house, where the workmen lived.'

'The girls didn't work the farm, that was my younger brother.'

'See, the way it works with boys is that they inherit the farm; the girls get a sum of money as their share. You don't cut a successful property up, as it becomes unviable.'

Pam clearly remembers the 1956 flood, which occurred when she was 'only eleven or twelve.' However, rather than describing the flood as a disaster, Pam says that 'It was a ball! I was in grade 7, and the primary school – of 200 or 300 kids – was shut.'

'There's a railway line between Paringa and Renmark – it's built up. So, they would shuttle passengers from the Paringa station. They had an 18-foot bank around Renmark.'

'To get the school open, the Principal walked the train line to Paringa every morning, before the trains started at 7am.'

Pam was clearly inspired by his tenacity, as she went on to become a school teacher herself, teaching home economics, history, geography, and English.

Butterfly Garden at Aldinga House

Guests of Resthaven's new respite cottage at 18 Halcyon Circuit, Aldinga Beach, will soon enjoy the benefits of a 'butterfly garden', thanks to the efforts of Support Worker, Lorraine Maslen.

Lorraine, who has worked with Resthaven for six years, explains, 'I live at Seaford, and grow milkweed in my garden.'

'I noticed last year that there were so many butterflies opening up in my garden.'

'So, we decided to do the same here, and we went and bought some seedlings, which are growing at the moment.'

'We have milkweed and other flowers, to attract lots of butterflies. Some are already planted in the tubs, and others in seedling trays.' Lorraine is pictured holding the seedlings, below.

'They don't look like much now, but hopefully by the time summer comes, we'll have a heap of butterflies coming in, especially Monarchs.'





The butterfly garden project has inspired craft activities at the site, with guests such as Mr Rod McLeod (above, with Lorraine) enjoying making butterflies out of milk cartons, and adding their creation to a display on the outdoor patio.

Projects such as this are all part of the job for Lorraine, who says, 'I love spending time with people, building relationships and enjoying quality time.'

Resthaven operates eight respite cottages across South Australia, providing short term, day or overnight stays for older people.

Guests enjoy a cosy, home-like environment, with qualified staff onsite 24/7 during overnight stays, giving their family carers peace of mind to take a break from their caring role, so that they can take care of themselves.

Exploring the Tantanoola Caves


Recently, clients from Resthaven Limestone Coast Community Services were invited to tour the two-million-year-old rock formations in the Tantanoola Caves Conservation Park, Tantanoola South Australia.

This highly visited tourist spot consists of a 30m wide by 8m high rock chamber, located inside the prehistoric marine cliff, the Up and Down Rock. The unique rock formations we see today were gradually formed over 2 million years by the constant crashing of waves. This is one of the the only naturally occurring caves in Australia that is fully wheelchair accessible.

Resthaven Limestone Coast Community Services Coordinator, Kate Farana, says, 'We are always looking for new and exciting outings to offer clients, and the Tantanoola Caves is a popular destination, so we had to put it on the agenda!'

The group of interested clients joined together on the Resthaven bus, eager to learn more about the history of the area they reside in.





'We all enjoyed learning more about the history of the location, and the geological explanation behind the rock formations.

'Following our tour, clients and staff relaxed at the local pub for a spot of lunch, visiting the Tantanoola Tiger before heading home.'

'On the way back, clients commented on what a great experience it was and how they would love to explore more local tourist spots with the group.'

'We enjoy offering new experiences to the clients we support. We can see firsthand that these opportunities keep the mind active and curious, while helping others to come out of their shell."

Llamajoy at Old Noarlunga

Resthaven Coordinator, Corinne Lama, is living up to her namesake, introducing a 'Llamajoy' program for Resthaven Onkaparinga Community Services clients, providing therapeutic social encounters with llamas.



Working together with local llama owner, Sherilee, Corinne has created an experience that can be personalised to support the individual health and mobility needs of Resthaven clients.

Corinne explains, 'One program includes making items from llama wool, using the old technique of the spinning wheel to make the yarn, which is then hand-dyed. Clients make the items whilst sitting in the shade under a tree with the llamas resting around them.'

'Our first client, Margaret, enjoyed her llama experience so much that she is now using her Home Care Package funding to support this fortnightly as a social outing.'

'Margaret always wanted to learn how to use the spinning wheel, but never achieved this goal.'

Margaret was certainly enamoured of the experience, sharing her recollections here. On Tuesday, I had a new experience – I went walking with llamas at Old Noarlunga. I had been told about them, but had not had the experience until then. Corinne, our Coordinator, had asked me to try this out as a possible social outing. I told her, 'I'm biased because



I'm absolutely besotted with all animals!' When I learned that Sherilee, who runs the service, also spins their wool, and is based in a lovely old Uniting Church, I was really and truly hooked.

Most people are familiar with alpacas, but this is my first contact with llamas, who are the larger members of the family. In South America, they are used as pack animals, as we use horses and donkeys.

On meeting Sherilee's llamas, 'Peaches' and 'Sunset,' I had to allow then to sniff my face, which might be a bit confronting for some people, but not me. After most of my life associating with a variety of animals, I am well accustomed to having my face near them!

After our walk, we had a cuppa at the church, which is a lovely building where services are still held each Sunday.



Then, we took a look at the spinning wheel, and the homemade felted articles Sherilee makes.

Someone asked if you could ride the llamas? The answer was, 'probably', but in the meantime,

Sherilee is planning on having a cart made, which they can pull, for children to ride in.

All in all, it was a wonderful experience, and one I intend to have again.

She was born on a small German island in the Baltic Sea named Wollin (Wollin belonged to the rural region of Pommern, which would later become part of Poland after the Second World War).


It was here Trudi met her future husband, Egbert Kalisch, who was in the airforce and stationed on the island during the war. They were married in 1944.

On 15 November 2022, Resthaven Port Elliot resident, Mrs Mavis Wimshurst, celebrated her 100th birthday. She reflects on her life full of hard work, resilience, and unwavering dedication to family.

Mrs Wimshurst's dedication to her children stems from her childhood years — she never knew her parents and was raised in an orphanage and foster care homes throughout South Australia. 'I never felt a real sense of belonging throughout my childhood,' explains Mrs Wimshurst. 'I ran away from my foster carers when I was barely a teenager and lived on a houseboat on the Murray River for a few years. Then, I trained as a seamstress before joining the war effort as a telephonist.'

'During the war, I met my future husband, Harry. He was in the Air Force, stationed in New Guinea, but he'd come home on leave. We were very happy. I fell pregnant with our first child, a boy we named James — Jimmy for short!'

'Jimmy was still a young child while Harry was fighting the war in New Guinea. So, I spent time with other women whose husbands were at war or had been killed. Together, we looked after all the children. One of the best moments of my life was when Harry returned from the war. We were finally a family.'

After the war, Mr Wimshurst worked as a handyman, while Mrs Wimshurst once again took up work as a seamstress. Of course, Mrs Wimshurst made her own wedding dress! The family resided in Semaphore, welcoming two more children, sons Ross and Brian.

Challenging times struck when Jimmy was diagnosed with cerebral palsy. 'The doctors told us that he wouldn't live beyond seven years old, so I made it my mission to care for Jimmy as long as I could,' says Mrs Wimshurst. 'The boys had such great fun, always getting into mischief. I would hear Jimmy laugh and just know they were up to no good!'

Mrs Wimshurst's lifelong mission to care for Jimmy led her to work as an educator at the Home for Incurables (later known as the Julia Farr Centre). The now-closed facility was a hospital and care home for people



living with disabilities in Fisher Street, Fullarton.

'I worked at the Home for Incurables with many friends, who also had children living with physical or mental disabilities,' says Mrs Wimshurst. 'It was such important work at a time when children were labelled "incurable" because of their illness or disability. Over everything else, I wanted to show these children that they were wanted in the world, and shouldn't be "pushed out" because they were different.'

Sadly, Jimmy passed away in the 1980s at age 31. Mrs Wimshurst reflects on his life fondly: 'I am so proud of the life Jimmy was able to lead. The doctors told us seven years, but we had 31 amazing years with him. We were so lucky.'

After Mr Wimshurst passed away in the 1990s, Mrs Wimshurst went to live with Brian in Victoria. Later, she moved back to South Australia and lived in Victor Harbor with Ross, and her daughter-in-law, Deb. For a while, Mrs Wimshurst received services at home from Resthaven Murray Bridge, Hills & Fleurieu Community Services, before moving to residential care at Resthaven Port Elliot.

When asked the secret to her long life, Mrs Wimshurst credits her family, 'I have been blessed with children, grandchildren, greatgrandchildren and great-great-grandchildren! My family is everything.'
