STILL NO PLATYPODES

Environment Minister SUSAN CLOSE's vision of reintroducing platypuses (plural also can be platypodes) to the River Torrens rang a bell so I hunted through the Tiser archives. Sure enough, on July 29, 1996, River Torrens Catchment Management Board chair JAY HOGAN was talking up cleaning the waterway so the monotremes

might be reintroduced "within five years." There were plans for a conference and corporate sponsorship for a breeding program.

"Platypus in a river is the ultimate sign of a river's health," he said at the time. Just on 27 years later, rather than five years, it's still talk — a great aim, but when all is said and done, a lot more is said than done.
